City of Ansonia Sustainable Materials Management Grant Final Report

December 23, 2023

Summary of Pilot Program

The City of Ansonia applied for and received a Sustainable Materials Management Grant (SMM) from the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) for up to \$420,500 to pilot principles of unit-based pricing and organics diversion citywide. The contract (ID #2023-30) was executed on November 22, 2022. The Naugatuck Valley Council of Governments (NVCOG) entered into a separate contract with DEEP (ID #2023-180) to provide education and outreach services on behalf of Ansonia during the course of the grant.

The SMM pilot officially launched on December 5, 2022. Bags were distributed to participating households during the preceding weeks. During that time, contractor Waste Zero (WZ) realized that the original estimate of households provided by the former public works director was about 1,000 short. In order to address the shortfall, more boxes of bags were ordered and distributed immediately so that all Ansonia households (in buildings with less than five units) were able to participate, as was originally envisioned.

Given that the expense of extra bags was not accounted for in the grant budget, Ansonia, DEEP, and WZ agreed to "borrow" money from the end of the grant period, truncating what was supposed to be a 9-month pilot to a 7-month pilot. Ansonia followed up with a letter to DEEP dated 1/20/23 (Attachment A) requesting an additional \$45,385 to restore the program to its original 9 months. No reply was received.

During the grant period, NVCOG engaged in a number of outreach strategies. For several days leading up to the program launch, NVCOG and WZ staff tabled outside the Ansonia Stop & Shop with large poster and flyers to raise awareness about the program. The Trash Reduction Kickoff Fair took place on 1/21/23 at the Ansonia Public Library, where tabletop food scrap containers were handed out. Over 75 individuals attended. A smaller Community Champions Dinner was held 1/12/23, with participation from Mayor Cassetti, the Chair of the Board of Aldermen, and several members of the public. A "what's in, what's out" recycling workshop was held in partnership with RecycleCT on 1/24/23. Additionally, NVCOG maintained a Facebook presence at @NVCOGReduceTheTrash, with regular informational and educational postings in Ansonia community groups (Attachment B). Phone calls from residents were answered throughout the entire grant period, with subject matters ranging from missed shipments to recycling questions to wondering where to get more bags. NVCOG was asked to pause outreach for Ansonia in spring of 2023.

The program officially concluded on July 5, 2023. Beyond submitting a letter of intent on 5/12/23, Ansonia did not engage in any permanence planning and does not intend to continue the program at this time.

Pre- and Post-Implementation Waste & Recycling Data

Waste and recycling data were tracked by WZ. Metrics included clean food capture rate, pounds of food scraps captured, contamination rate, percentage waste reduction, and percentage diversion (recycling + food scraps). The final, cumulative set of data for Ansonia was made available 8/21/23 read as follows:

Additionally, WZ charted overall diversion, diversion rate change, recycling increase, weekly food capture, and waste reduction week-by-week. The graphs are included as Attachment E.

Pilot Successes

- Phone calls, event attendance, and green & orange bags lining the streets on trash day sent a clear message: hundreds of Ansonia residents were willing to participate in the trash reduction pilot.
- Resident interest in recycling increased as a result of this pilot. NVCOG received numerous phone calls and emails with recycling questions, even after the pilot had concluded.
- Ansonia experienced a noteworthy increase in diversion (44%) and an increase in waste reduction (17%) compared to the previous year. This indicates that the pilot was working as intended by capturing food scraps and sparking changes in behavior.
- A number of positive quotes were received from residents, as recorded in Ansonia's and NVCOG's progress reports.
- Partnerships were initiated with local businesses, Ansonia Public Library, Country Disposal, and other stakeholders. These could prove useful for potential future efforts.

Pilot Challenges

- The timing of the pilot's launch was challenging for two reasons: first, DEEP only finalized the contract two weeks before the start date, leaving Ansonia little time to prepare and get the word out to residents. Second, starting a waste reduction program during the holidays (a busy and waste-intensive time of year) contributed to these difficulties.
- The initial estimate for the number of participating houses in the pilot area was incorrect, leaving Ansonia over 1,000 boxes of bags short. This forced the 9-month pilot into a 7-month pilot.
 - DEEP never replied to the request for extra funding, which would have restored the pilot to 9 months.
- Communication between City decision-makers, and DEEP/NVCOG/Waste Zero became a significant challenge during the second half of the pilot.
 - There was an inability to meet and communicate consistently with the Board of Aldermen.
 - There were fundamental misunderstandings about finances and the purpose of the pilot that were never resolved.

- According to DEEP and WZ, not all of the green bags collected in Ansonia made it to the anaerobic digestor due to issues with Country Disposal and Quantum Biopower.
- The number of food scrap collection bins budgeted for in the grant fell considerably short of accommodating demand. Even with a second shipment, there were still many people who wanted the free food scrap bins.
- NVCOG was asked to pause outreach activities less than halfway through the pilot period.
 Opportunities to promote the project beyond the launch and share data and facts that might have reduced some misinformation were missed.
- No feedback sessions were held for residents.
- Misinformation and negative back-and-forth on Facebook promulgated a bad reputation for the pilot and might have swayed the opinions of Aldermen.
- The amount of time between the submission of Ansonia's requests for reimbursement and the receipt of funds was unacceptable in the eyes of municipal staff. This ongoing situation may have discouraged the City from pursuing future undertakings with DEEP.

Metrics Applicable to Other CT Municipalities

Other Connecticut towns may be interested in the data exhibited in Attachment E, as an indicator of whether a similar pilot would make sense for their community. A demographic analysis can help those communities understand what similarities and difference they share with Ansonia, and whether its SMM metrics may be applicable.

All stats are from census.gov. Comparisons are from usa.com. *Income comparison data is from 2010-2014, so it is outdated.

Note that further investigation would need to be undertaken to determine if the comparable communities have a similar waste management system to Ansonia's.

Next Steps

Ansonia does not have any plans to continue the strategies piloted during the SMM grant at this time.

The City acknowledges that a pay-as-you-throw or unit-based pricing (UBP) program could fund the continuation of the organics diversion efforts from the pilot. However, it is the belief of City staff and officials that UBP is not a good fit for Ansonia. Due to Ansonia's status as an economically distressed and environmental justice community, any program that would put a financial burden on residents is unlikely to gain enough support for implementation.

That being said, Ansonia encourages other municipalities to look into the benefits of combining and organics program with UBP, both as a funding mechanism and as a waste reduction tool.

Ansonia's Sustainable Materials Management (SMM) pilot program launched at the beginning of December with orange and green bag distribution to all residential buildings containing less than five units. During the distribution process, it was discovered that the number participating of households had been underestimated. The figure given by the now-retired Public Works Director for the grant application was 5,941 households; Waste Zero rounded up and ordered 6,000 boxes. However, this number did not account for all multifamily households, leaving the distribution crew short about 1,100 boxes during what was supposed to be the final distribution day, December 5, 2022. The constrained timeline of the rollout did not leave an opportunity for the typical double-checking.

In order to deal with this issue as swiftly as possible, Ansonia, CT DEEP, NVCOG, and Waste Zero agreed to truncate the pilot from nine months to seven. This gave Ansonia immediate access to funds for the additional bags. Those bags were produced, shipped, and distributed by December 22. As of today, all participating households have an adequate supply of bags.

Ansonia is requesting additional funding from DEEP to restore the program to its original nine-month duration. Budget computations by Waste Zero indicate that a grant in the amount of \$45,385 would fill the gap left by the miscalculation. Please see the attached spreadsheet for details.





Q: WHAT'S IN THE BOX?

A 9-month supply of free bags: 78 Orange Trash Bags & 37 Green Food Scraps Bags! As you reduce your trash, this should be enough bags. Local stores will sell them, too.



Q: WHAT GOES IN THE GREEN BAG?

Food Scraps: Fruits & vegetables, meat & seafood (including bones), eggs & eggshells, leftovers & spoiled food, coffee grounds & tea bags, pastas, bread, grains, & napkins. **Please do NOT include plastic, pet waste, sanitary items, or metal.**



Q: WHAT GOES IN THE ORANGE BAG?

Anything that doesn't go in the Green Food Scraps Bag and can't be recycled.



Q: WHERE DO I PUT MY FULL BAGS?

In the **same** trash can, on the **same** pick-up day. They will be sorted later.



Q: WHY CAN'T I USE MY NORMAL TRASH BAGS?

We are asking you to use ONLY the special heavy-duty Orange Trash Bags. Bags will be collected together, and the color-coding allows for sorting. We are also building the habit of using special city trash bags that help "measure" each household's trash.



Q: DO I STILL RECYCLE?

YES! Continue to put recyclables in the blue bin. Go to RecycleCT.com with questions.



Q: DO I NEED TO PUT ANOTHER GARBAGE CAN IN MY KITCHEN?

Do what works best for your household! You could get (or repurpose) a small container with a lid to hold the Green Food Scraps Bag, or you could keep the Green Bag loosely tied in your trash cart and empty food scraps into it throughout the week.

Q: IS THIS ACTUALLY GOING TO WORK?

- Turning all of our food waste into clean energy makes a huge difference. The program also introduces
 the idea of moving the cost to dispose of trash OUT of your taxes and INTO the bags. The less trash
 you make, the less you would pay. With these tools, you can reduce your trash and save money.
- You may be trying this for the first time, but cities all over the U.S. (and the world!) have successfully
 piloted similar trash reduction programs. Ansonia will succeed with your participation!



SMM GRANT PILOT CUMULATIVE DIVERSION RATE CHANGE






SMM GRANT DIVERSION (CUMULATIVE WEEKLY TREND 2022 TO 2023
